MEMORANDUM OF POINTS AND AUTHORITIES

I. Introduction

On February 21, 2018, the Authority issues a Notice of Intent to Terminate NVA's charter school contract (referred to herein as "the Notice"). Following the issuance of the Notice, NVA submitted a "Comprehensive Academic Improvement Plan" in order to attempt to correct the deficiencies identified in the Notice. The deficiencies identified in the Notice related to NVA's elementary school, and its persistent underperformance as defined in NAC 386.332. At its May 14, 2018 Board meeting, the SPCSA Board rejected NVA's Comprehensive Academic Improvement Plan. As a result, a public hearing is scheduled for June 25, 2018, in order for the SPCSA Board to determine whether to terminate NVA's charter school contract.

II. Legal Authority

In part, NRS 388A.330(1)(a) reads as follows:

- "...the sponsor of a charter school may ... revoke a written charter or terminate a charter contract before the expiration of the charter if the sponsor determines that:
 - (a) The charter school, its officers or its employees:
- (1) Committed a material breach of the terms and conditions of the written charter or charter contract;
 - (2) Failed to comply with generally accepted standards of fiscal management;
- (3) Failed to comply with the provisions of this chapter or any other statute or regulation applicable to charter schools; or
- (4) If the charter school holds a charter contract, has persistently underperformed, as measured by the performance indicators, measures and metrics set forth in the performance framework for the charter school;

...;

NAC 386.332 defines "persistent underperformance" as:

(1) The charter school was not rated in the first, second or third highest tier during the last three ratings of the charter school pursuant to the statewide system of accountability for public schools; or

(2) If the charter school is operating under a charter contract, the charter school has not complied consistently with the performance indicators, measures and metrics set forth in the performance framework of the charter school, as determined by the sponsor.

Furthermore, NRS 388A.330(1)(g) states that a charter school contract may be terminated if:

[p]upil achievement and school performance at the charter school is unsatisfactory as determined by the Department pursuant to criteria prescribed by regulation by the Department to measure the performance of any public school pursuant to the statewide system of accountability for public schools.

Notably, in addition providing the Authority with the discretion to terminate a charter school contract, NRS 388A.330(7) allows the Authority to amend the school's charter school contract to eliminate low performing grade levels. In part, NRS 388A.300(7) reads as follows:

If the sponsor of a charter school determines that not all of the grade levels in the charter school meet the criteria described in paragraphs (a) to (g), inclusive, of subsection 1 and that the charter school can remain financially viable if the charter school continues to operate and serve only the grade levels which do not meet the criteria described in those paragraphs, the sponsor may amend the written charter or charter contract, as applicable, to eliminate the grade levels that meet the criteria described in paragraphs (a) to (g), inclusive, of subsection 1 and limit the enrollment in all other grade levels in the charter school.

III. NVA Performance

NVA originally entered into a six-year written charter in 2007 by its then-sponsor, Nevada's Department of Education. NVA's charter school contract expires on June 30, 2019.

In 2013, NVA applied for renewal of its written contract. In regard to NVA's charter school contract renewal application in 2013, SPCSA staff noted in its recommendation that NVA exhibited "persistent academic underperformance," "low continuous enrolled percentages," "low graduation rates," and "a high percentage of students transferring out before graduation." In conclusion, the SPCSA found that NVA's "academic program has not been a success."

Notwithstanding the foregoing, in 2013 the Authority renewed NVA's written charter, upon certain conditions. NVA's 2013 charter school contract included an expiration date of June 29, 2019. These conditions included NVA facing a "high stakes review" during the Fall of 2015, at

which time NVA was to show "substantial progress" to improve its academic performance.

In September of 2013, the Authority issued NVA a Notice of Concern due to academic underperformance. The Notice of Concern noted that NVA's elementary, middle, and high school had all recently been rated as 2-Stars under the Department of Education's Nevada School Performance Framework.

One year later, in December of 2014, the Authority issued NVA a Notice of Breach due to academic underperformance related to the 2013-2014 academic school year. While NVA's middle school was ranked in 2015 as a 3-Star school under the NSPF, NVA's elementary and high school were still ranked as 2-Star schools.

Although the high-stakes review originally scheduled for the Fall of 2015 was ultimately postponed until 2016, NVA's high-stakes review ultimately resulted in SPCSA staff recommending to the Authority that NVA's charter school contract be terminated due to NVA's consistent academic underperformance. However, the Authority Board elected not to terminate NVA's charter school contract.

In 2015 and 2016, the Department of Education did not release ratings due to testing irregularities and changes to federal law.

However, in December of 2017, the Department of Education released new ratings for the 2016-2017 academic school year.

Below is a table summarizing NVA's historical enrollment from the 2011-2012 school year to present, broken down by grade level. Note that NVA's enrollment has decreased from a high of 3,500 students to approximately 2,000 students for the 2017-2018 school year.

Note that NVA's high school graduation rate has steadily increased from 36% in 2012 to 84% for the 2016-2017 school year.

Since its charter school contract was renewed in 2013, NVA has submitted a number of reports, updates, and academic improvement plans to the Authority. Notably, these reports and

plans have had little impact on the academic performance of NVA's middle school, and no impact whatsoever on the academic performance o of NVA's elementary school.

In regard to NVA's financial performance, NVA was issued a Notice of Concern for the 2015-2016 school year. Below is a comparison related to NVA's financial performance for the 2015-2016 school year and the 2016-2017 school year.
