Dear Ms. Mackedon,

In the spirit of transparency and collaboration, the Clark County School District (CCSD) is providing this communication in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) related to charter school applications submitted for consideration.

Pursuant to NRS 388A.225(1)(b), when a sponsor of a charter school is not a school district, the sponsor is required to notify both the Nevada Department of Education (NDE) and the board of trustees of the school district in which the proposed charter school will be located within 45 days of receiving the application. This notification must include the information outlined in NRS 388A.225(2)(a–d), which encompasses critical details such as the academic and operational model, proposed student population, and location of the school.

Additionally, NRS 388A.249(2)(d) requires that the sponsor solicit input from the board of trustees of the school district regarding any proposed charter schools within its geographic boundaries. In alignment with this requirement, CCSD has reviewed the applications submitted to the Nevada State Public Charter School Authority and is providing the attached input, which describes potential issues/deficiencies with the proposed applications.

NRS 388A.220(6) mandates that before a city that is approved to sponsor charter schools approves an application to form a charter school, the city shall prepare, in collaboration with NDE and, to the extent practicable, the school district in which the proposed charter school will be located and any other sponsor of a charter school located in that school district, an evaluation of the demographic information of pupils, the academic needs of pupils and the needs of any pupils who are at risk of dropping out of school in the geographic areas served by the sponsor. CCSD is available to collaborate at your convenience.

We appreciate the opportunity to work in partnership with municipalities to ensure that proposed charter school developments align with broader community priorities, infrastructure capacity, and student needs. The zip codes provided for the intended service encompass a large geographic area with five high schools with varying demographic profiles. Through the 2015 Capital Improvement Program, the Clark County School District has invested within these zip codes to support community needs.
