DECLARATION OF MARISA DELGADO

- I, Marisa Delgado, hereby declare under penalty of perjury as follows:
- 1. I am a Nevada Connections Academy ("NCA") board member. I make this declaration in support of NCA relative to closure proceedings before the State Public Charter School Authority held on May 25, 26, and 27, 2017, and continued to an unspecified date in 2017.
- 2. The matters set forth in this declaration are based on my own personal knowledge. If called upon to testify, I am competent to testify to the matters set forth herein.
- 3. I am recently accepted the position as principal of Saint Francis de Sales for the 2017-2018 school year, a K-8 private grade school. Prior to that, starting in 2009, I was the math department chair, math teacher, mentor teacher, and assistant student leadership advisor at Bishop Gorman High School in Las Vegas, Nevada. I have a bachelor's degree in Secondary Education Mathematics from the University of Nevada, Reno, and a master's degree in Educational Leadership from the University of Cincinnati. I also have both current teaching license and administrative license in the state of Nevada.
- 4. I have served on the NCA board for approximately four years. As such, I attend monthly meetings, look over monthly packages and media sources, evaluate administrators, attend graduations, and have attended charter authority meetings. We also have monthly

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meetings with NCA regarding goals, student performance, and expectations. NCA provides NCA School Leader Steve Werlein with a mentor that evaluates and gives feedback to the board about how he is doing and his data analysis. The NCA board has also increased our review of the school's data to drive the curriculum and student improvement.

- 5. NCA's graduation rate has been a prevalent topic of discussion with the NCA board. However, examining the data, we recognize that within our 4-year cohort, those who enter NCA their freshman year, graduate a rate over 80%. NCA's K-5 program is doing an exemplary job—test scores are great. Middle school is doing a good job as well, focusing on literacy and math to continue to improve. With regard to NCA's ability to serve its students well, the state's calculation of the "graduation rate" is flawed.
- 6. In efforts to improve its graduation rate as the state calculates it, NCA has implemented a credit recovery program, hired a new employee that concentrates on student retention and checking in and out students that are considered at-risk. We also have raised the standard of our students that are considered at-risk. We may have more at-risk students due to this, but it has been effective in helping to identify at-risk students earlier on and addressing issues quickly. We have approved summer school funds for credit recovery. We have a literacy director and have increased scaffolding for math programs. NCA also provides overwhelming support for parents and students who need it—including summer school scholarships, one-on-one face time with teachers, and periodic check-ins.
- 7. As a longtime educator, I feel that student learning should be the center of all we do in education, and I recognize that a single data point does not always reflect that. We serve a different population: transient students, bullied students, athletes, credit-deficient students, behavior students, etc. For example, a student that enrolls with NCA credit-deficient and remains enrolled for a mere 14 days cannot be considered an accurate reflection of NCA's ability to serve

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its students. Likewise, a student who leaves NCA and enrolls in a different school but is not diligent about providing paperwork from the second school is considered a dropout, counting against NCA's graduation rate and again not accurately reflecting NCA's ability.

- I am concerned that the proceedings before the State Public Charter School 8. Authority are impeding our ability to prioritize student education—which is NCA's main goal and the goal that the NCA board primarily oversees. NCA spent money, at SPCSA Staff Director Patrick Gavin's direction, on a private investigator to locate students when we could be spending money on student learning. I am concerned about the expenditure of funds required to do this and to otherwise defend against Authority Staff's threats of closure because the money we spend on locating departed students takes away from the money we spend to educate the student population that are enrolled with NCA. Likewise, we cannot be putting student education first if the Authority expects the school to bring credit-deficient students up to speed at an impossible rate—if a student failed the majority of classes at his or her previous school in the previous year, then enrolls in NCA and takes advantage of NCA's credit-recovery program to make up credits, the school cannot always reasonably expect the student to make up credits in time to graduate in four years while also prioritizing the student's learning and retention of the information. To require too much of students would, at some point, infringe upon NCA's obligation to do its due diligence as an educational institution.
- 9. In preparing the graduation rate improvement plan submitted to the Authority in 2016, we had lengthy conversations with NCA and with school administrators about how we can hold our students accountable, help students be successful, and provide for them the support required to achieve success.
- 10. I have been involved in efforts to procure new NCA board members, and have personally tried to recruit several people in the education world and reviewed resumes sent to the

board. I have found that it is very difficult to find replacements for board members who leave.

During our meetings we have in depth conversations about applicants' qualifications and whether they are qualified to fill a vacant seat, based on our by-laws. Because it has been so challenging to find educated, qualified candidates, without a conflict of interest that are willing to volunteer their time, it has taken a year to find a replacement for a current member.

11. Based on my experience as an NCA board member, I feel that our board is not the reason behind the Authority's concern about the high school's graduation rate, and reconstitution of NCA's board would not address the Authority's concern. The root of the concern lies in the Authority's view of the school as a single flawed data point instead of looking at the school as a whole.

I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of Nevada that the foregoing is true and corrected and was executed this 12 day of June, 2017, in 105 Vegas.
